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# GET TO KNOW EAYN



Following our introduction to the East Asia Youth Network's (EAYN) mission and structure in the last issue, let's have a closer look at the EAYN Working Groups (WGs)!

The EAYN established four WGs in 2023, open to all Red Cross youth across East Asia National Societies (EANSs). These WGs aim to support the implementation of the EAYN Plan of Action, expand opportunities for grassroots youth to engage in the RCRC Movement, and cultivate future youth leaders for EANSs. The four WGs are: Activities Support, Communication, Research & Initiatives, and Information Integration. To reduce language barriers, this year each working group allocated half of its spots to volunteers who prefer to work in their native language, corresponding to the language of the WG's leading members. 

## EAYN Disaster Preparedness and Community Resilience Workshop




EA youth contributed to regional initiatives, including:

## 12 Youth Join Asia Pacific Youth Network Academy of Leadership and Innovation

The Asia Pacific Youth Network (APYN) Academy of Leadership and Innovation has officially launched, bringing together 50 participants and mentors from 26 countries to tackle global humanitarian challenges! Supported by IFRC, this six-month online training program aimed at empowering young leaders within the Movement with skills to address complex humanitarian challenges. ## IFRC AP Volunteering Research

The IFRC launched the AP Volunteering Research, bringing together a diverse group of volunteers to gather localized perspectives that strengthen volunteer engagement strategies and better connect global frameworks with grassroots realities. The research also included a focus group discussion to gain deeper insights from volunteers.

CHEN Xi and FAN Xinyi Felicia from the EAYN Working Group contributed to this process by facilitating the discussion with Chinese Red Cross volunteers and producing a comprehensive 3,000-word report.

The 7th International Disaster Resilience Seminar, organized by the Asia Pacific Disaster Resilience Centre (APDRC) to commemorate the 120th anniversary of the Republic of Korea National Red Cross, was jointly held with APYN and EAYN. This year's theme, "From Heat to Hope: Youth Shaping Resilient Humanitarian Futures," highlights youth leadership and voices in addressing the climate crisis, particularly the growing challenge of heatwaves. The seminar also served as a platform to share case studies and best practices from across the Asia Pacific region. LIU Nianhua and PAN Wenfeng from the Red Cross Society of China presented their youth-led initiatives on heatwave response and resilience.

EAYN Vice Chair Akihiro served as the preparation team manager, while Committee members Erica and Sunny, and Working Group members PAN Wenfeng, Guyen Mungunkhuyag, YUE Rachel, and Oyunchimeg contributed their valuable support to the seminar.

**Finally, we are prepared to contribute to accomplishing IFRC's effort to the climate crisis by raising awareness of the severe impacts of heatwaves and the climate crisis by discussing scientific approaches, policy challenges, and the need for community cooperation in response efforts.**

**In full recognition of our collective responsibility and power as youth, we declare these commitments as a unified voice of youth from the Asia-Pacific region to contribute meaningfully to global climate action and resilience building.**

EAYN Vice-Chair Akihiro and Committee Member and KNRC Youth Representative Yeeun jointly delivered the declaration, reaffirming youth commitment to supporting a greener and more resilient future.

# YOUTH ON THE MOVE



## 1.Honoring a Century of Child Advocacy: MRCSS Youth celebrate 100 years of Commitment to Children

On May 8, the Mongolian Red Cross Society took part in a ceremonial flag-raising ceremony held at Sate Palace to mark the 100th anniversary of the Mongolian Children's Organization. This meaningful occasion held particular significance for MRCSS youth and Junior Red Cross members, as it honored a century-long legacy of youth participation and child-focused development in Mongolia. Their participation in this historic national celebration reaffirmed their commitment to humanitarian values and their vital role in advancing youth empowerment and child advocacy throughout the country.



## 2.Youth Engagement Mission: Strengthening Junior Red Cross Participation and Humanitarian Values Across Western Mongolia



From April 21 to 25, 2025, S. Ganzorig, a staff member of the Youth and Junior Red Cross Movement Team, conducted a field mission to the Arkhangai, Zavkhan, and Uvs provinces. Throughout the mission, a series of mobilization meetings, training sessions, and engagement events were organized to activate and inspire Junior Red Cross members across the region. These efforts aimed to deepen youth participation in humanitarian action, promote the core principles of the Red Cross Movement, and support local branches in sustaining youth-led initiatives for long-term impact.

## 1. Rwanda Drawing Project: Humanitarian Support with Crayons and Pens



Students from Jumonji Junior and Senior High School in Tokyo launched the “Rwanda Drawing Project” to support children’s right to learn in April. They collected crayons and pens, and sent them to Rwandan children, who responded with their

first colorful drawings. These artworks were exhibited in Japan, and later used to create goods sold at school events, with proceeds donated to support education in Rwanda. A Rwanda RC staff visited Japan and shared the children’s joy. The exchange, including student-made Swahili comics, highlighted the power of youth-led action in fostering empathy and global connection. It showed that even small efforts can make a lasting impact, one crayon at a time.

## 2. JRCS Youth Committee Kicked Off Fiscal Year 2025

On May 18, the first JRCS Youth Committee Meeting for Fiscal Year 2025 was held. Youth members from across the country gathered to participate in the meeting. The day began with opening remarks, an icebreaker, and a presentation on the committee’s role and responsibilities.



They reflected on the contents of National Red Cross Youth Corps Council held the previous day and exchanged ideas on applying their insights to local initiatives. In the afternoon, discussions focused on global Red Cross efforts, including IFRC, APYN, EAYN and the Y.E.S.2.0 Strategy. The committee suggested improvements such as updating communication tools and standardizing report formats. The meeting ended with strengthened commitment to youth-led efforts.

## 1. The 14th Youth Volunteer Festival

The "Youth Volunteer Festival" was held on May 10. Organized by the RCY Seoul Council and hosted by the Seoul branch of the KNRC, the event was a venue for a festival where RCY members and citizens were harmonized under the support of the Seoul Metropolitan Office of Education and Seoul Metro. With the slogan of 'The First Step in Youth-led Change,' the festival delivered a warm resonance from beginning to end.



A total of 40 booths conveyed the value of volunteer work in a creative way to visitors. There were various activities such as making endangered species bottle cap key rings. Besides, the main campaign subject of RCY, such as blood donation and first aid booths, were conducted through the use of human body models.

## 2. 'Chon's Lover' project: Deliver appreciation with delicious chicken



'Chon's Lover' project is a collaboration with Korean Chicken brand. This project aims to deliver gratitude to people with fried chicken. Many branches, including Seoul, Busan, Incheon, Daegu, Daejeon Sejong, Gyeonggi, and Gwangju Jeonnam have held this project since May.

In commemoration of Teachers' Day, the Gwangju Jeonnam branch shared bread made by the teacher and their students with neighbors in need and delivered fried chicken to the teacher as an expression of appreciation. In the case of the Gyeonggi branch, RCY members delivered gratitude and fried chicken to street cleaners working at the university to mark Environment Day. In the case of the Gyeongbuk branch, members visited the hospital and delivered handmade dolls and fried chicken to wish for the return of child patients to their daily lives.

## 1. Gathering Youth Power: A New Vision for Red Cross Youth Volunteer Service Development

Established in August 2024, the China Red Cross Youth Network (CNYN) is a youth-led platform dedicated to actively engaging in and supporting the core initiatives of the Red Cross Society of China.

On May 10, the **2025 Red Cross Youth Training and Communication Conference** was successfully held! Co-organized by the CNYN and the Xi'an "Three Donations" Red Cross Volunteer Service Team of Veteran College Students, the conference brought over 100 participants from 51 universities across 19 provinces together through integrated online and offline platforms. Youth leaders introduced their projects such as caring for female students, family-campus-community life education, organ donation and healthy lifestyle.

## 2. Voices for Humanity: The 15th Shanghai University International Humanitarian Debate Competition

On the same day, the 15th Shanghai University International Humanitarian Debate Final was held at Shanghai Jiao Tong University. This year's event attracted nearly 500 students from 50 universities across the city, who engaged in 61 intense matches across preliminary, quarter-final, semi-final and final rounds. As an important event for Red Cross Youth (RCY), the debate series integrates international humanitarian law into campus culture, fostering both critical thinking and humanitarian values among students.



## 1. Hong Kong Youth Nursing Competition 2025: RCY Members to Showcase Nursing Skills

The Hong Kong Youth Nursing Competition is a regular annual event for local RCY members in secondary schools. This year's competition was held on 6 April, following the district qualifiers.

In the competition, participants are required to provide proficient nursing interventions and advice for case patients. This event offers a platform for RCY members to demonstrate their nursing knowledge and practical skills, reflecting their dedication to healthcare service.



## 2. Hong Kong Friendship Competition 2025: RCY Members to Design Innovative Friendship Activities

The Hong Kong Friendship Competition, a regular annual event for local RCY members in secondary schools, took place on 20 April this year. This unique competition offers participants the chance to form teams either within their own unit or with members from other units.

The core challenge of the competition is for these teams to construct and lead an attractive and innovative friendship activity tailored to a specific audience.

The participating audience then experiences the games and rates their overall experience, providing valuable feedback on the creativity and effectiveness of each team's activity. This event reflects the RCY's commitment to building connections and community spirit among young people.



## 1. International Humanitarian Law Course Empowers Youth Leaders with Red Cross Core Values

International Humanitarian Law (IHL) is a substantial part of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement. In May, youth leaders had the opportunity to engage with Macau RCY. They explored various aspects of humanitarian law through discussions. These interactions allowed the youth leaders to deepen their understanding of IHL and its practical applications.



## 2. MRC's Basic Nursing Course Prepares Youth for Healthcare Careers



The basic nursing course, one of the featured courses of Macau RCY, equips members pursuing medical careers with theoretical knowledge. Early exposure enhances youths' capacity in caring for seniors and chronic disease patients, while providing insights into the healthcare industry. Serving as a career planning initiative, the course strategically prepares dedicated youth for future pathways.

## Special Column on World RCRC Day

May 8, 2025, marks the 78th World Red Cross and Red Crescent Day. On this significant day, we extend our heartfelt tribute to all volunteers and staff who selflessly stand on the side of humanity. To honor Henry Dunant, the founder of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement (the Movement), National Societies (NSs) across the globe will commemorate this day, week, or month with a diverse array of interesting activities.



In East Asia, young people are organizing and participating in creative and memorable events to uphold the Movement's spirit.

On May 7th and 8th, the China Red Cross Youth Network (CNYN) hosted **the fourth Chinese Red Cross Youth Salon themed on "Passionate Youth: Safeguarding Life Together"**. This youth-led salon aimed to deepen the understanding of blood donation, stem cell donation and first aid among youth, showcasing excellent practices from Chinese universities in related fields. Attracting approximately 100 participants, the exchange event created an interactive platform for youth engagement.

As of May 2025, the number of successful hematopoietic stem cell transplants from non-blood related donors has surpassed 20,000!


